2 Standard operating procedures

- 2.1.1 ARFFS Units require Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) to facilitate safety management practices when responding to emergencies.
- 2.1.2 A SOP is an instructional/reference document that provides information on ARFFS practices and procedures for a specific aerodrome. The formulation of the SOP should be the responsibility of the Fire Officer in Charge and be compliance achieved through consultation with operational staff.
- 2.1.3 Each SOP should be periodically updated to ensure relevance and validated through practice by operational staff during the unit training program.

	Tactical Plan
1.	Every ARFFS must develop tactical plans. These plans should identify the following:
	(a) available <u>resources;</u>
	(b) aircraft type including civil and military using the <u>aerodrome</u> ;
	(c) <u>terrain;</u>
	(d) effect of <u>wind;</u>
	(e) role of <u>personnel;</u>
	(f) function of <u>vehicles;</u>
	(g) positioning of <u>vehicles;</u>
	(h) initial attack; and
	(i) stand-by positions.
2.	The tactical plan should be practiced regularly to ensure familiarity with all operations.
